

NIAGARA REGIONAL AGRICULTURAL FAIR

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. Each exhibitor must have a current Membership for the Niagara Regional Agricultural Society. Membership fees: Senior (19 and older) Voting(2nd year) \$10.00
Senior (19 and older) Exhibitor \$5.00
and Junior (18 and under) \$5.00
Membership fees are not refundable. Junior Exhibitor may exhibit in any class above their age but **cannot** exhibit in classes below their age.
2. By showing Membership card, each Senior Membership is allowed one (1) free admission **once** during the NRE and each Junior Membership is allowed one (1) free admission **each** day of the NRE.
3. The prize money cheques will be mailed late June and must be cashed before July 31th. In the event of an error in the cheque, a second cheque will be issued.
4. The sum of \$5.00 shall be retained from every exhibitor obtaining the sum of \$10.00 or over in prize money to cover \$5 membership for the following year.
5. All individuals and organizations are to use the online entry (via the website: www.niagaraex.com) or ensure that the form is mailed to the office by **May 19, 2023** for your printed tickets to be mailed to you. Organizations please make your entry in the name of your organization and use your permanent mailing address. If postal code does not appear on the entry form, prize money will not be mailed.
6. All exhibits must be the bonafide property of the exhibitor. Any person showing anything for competition not his/her own shall forfeit prize money.
7. It shall be the duty of the judges to only award such premiums as they consider the exhibit is entitled. They may withhold the prize from any exhibit improperly classed or not worthy of a prize.
8. All exhibits receiving a premium must have an entry tag attached and, unless otherwise exempted, must remain until the close of the show. Prize money will be forfeited if this rule is violated.
9. All exhibits shall be at risk of the exhibitor.
10. Exhibits may be picked up ***Sunday between 4:30 and 5:30 pm or Monday 10 am to noon by showing their Membership card. Exhibits not picked up will become property of NRAS.**
11. All protest must be made in writing, must state plainly the cause of complaint or appeal, and must be delivered to the Secretary on the day of cause of protest accompanied by \$1.00 which will be forfeited to the Society if the protest is not sustained.
12. Prizes will be awarded as shown in the Judge's Book and no alteration can be made. Exhibits not entered on the entry form cannot be awarded prize money.
13. Specific regulations applying to each class of exhibit are given under each show. Please refer to index.
14. Any exhibitor or attendant, who is guilty of creating a disturbance, whether by openly criticizing the judge or using obscene language to any judge or officer, shall therefore forfeit the right to any premium and may be suspended by the Society from exhibiting.
15. Prize list is subject to correction of typographical errors and/or omissions. In the case of a disagreement, the ruling of the committee chair shall be final.
16. In the event of rain or inclement weather so affecting the gate receipts as to leave the holding of the Fair a financial loss after the Government Rain Insurance has been taken into account, the Society reserves the right to pay all premiums, awards of purses at a rate on the dollar sufficient to make good the loss.
17. Section 19 (2) of the Agricultural Societies Act preventing certain performances, huckstering or trafficking in merchandise etc., within three hundred yards of the fairgrounds on the days of Exhibition shall be enforced.

18. If **not three exhibitors** in livestock classes, the Fair Board will only **pay half the prize money**.
19. Exhibitor Book correct at time of printing
20. While the Directors of the Society will take every possible precaution under the circumstances to secure the safety of life and property at the Exhibition, the Society declares that it is strictly understood that exhibitors and others attend at their own risk. Should any article be accidentally injured, burned, lost or stolen, the Directors will give all assistance in their power for recovery, but they will not recognize any claim for payment of the value or portion thereof, and the Society will not be responsible for anyone being injured in any way on the grounds.
21. Information in this booklet was accurate at the time of printing. Any last-minute changes, corrections or clarifications are at the discretion of the Niagara Regional Agricultural Society and take precedence. Please note not all sponsors have been confirmed
22. **NOTICE:** Any information collected by the Niagara Regional Agricultural Society regarding members, exhibitors, commercial exhibitors, sponsors, directors and any other persons related directly to the business of the Niagara Regional Agricultural Society and the Niagara Regional Agricultural Fair will be solely used for the purposes of promotion of the Niagara Regional Agricultural Society and the Niagara Regional Agricultural Fair, and for the maintenance of their files and data base. Any member, exhibitor, commercial exhibitor, sponsor or director realizes that when they agree to take part in the Niagara Regional Agricultural Society and the Niagara Regional Agricultural Fair, that their names may be published for these reasons only. None of this information whatsoever will be sold or transferred to any outside party for any reason.

1. The Niagara Regional Agricultural Society will not be liable for any damages to the exhibits. All exhibits are displayed at the owner's risk. The Society will not be responsible for damages or theft.
2. The General Rules and Regulations of the Prize List apply to this Show. All classes are open to all.
3. Exhibits must fall within a class and section of the Prize List of this Show
4. ***All exhibits must be placed between *5:30 and 7:30 p.m. Thursday** of Fair week. Please use the online exhibitor entry or have your form to the office no later than **May 19, 2023** in order to have your tickets mailed to you.
5. Each exhibitor may exhibit only **ONCE** in each section.
6. Make sure you check to see if you are qualified to enter the class you want. (i.e.: if you are an individual, you cannot enter a class for Organizations only.) If you do, no prize money will be awarded.
7. ALL individuals and organizations are to use the online entry (via the website: www.niagaraex.com) or ensure that the form is to the office by **May 19, 2023** in order for your printed tickets to be mailed to you. Organizations please make your entry in the name of your organization and use your permanent mailing address. (If postal code does not appear on the entry form, prize money will not be mailed.)
8. Trays and dishes should be disposable. If this is not possible the owner's name, address, and telephone number **MUST** be marked on the bottom.
9. All exhibits must be NEW WORK and NEVER exhibited at this Fair before. All work must be clean and not appear to have been worn or used before being exhibited, or it will be disqualified. All exhibits must be handcrafted by the exhibitor.
10. The Committee is authorized by the Society to discard all soiled, defaced, or old work. In classes where there is no competition, unless the exhibit is worthy of a prize, the Judge need not award one and placement is at his/her discretion.
11. If the exhibitor wishes to sell an exhibit, the words FOR SALE and telephone number may be shown on the exhibitor's tag.
12. All exhibits must be removed from the building on **Sunday** between ***4:30 and 5:30 p.m.** or **Monday 10 am to noon**. Exhibitors are asked to use their memberships after 5 p.m. to enter the Grounds and pick-up their exhibits. Articles **not** picked up will not be the responsibility of the Society.
13. Articles not complying with the Prize List may be exhibited at the owner's risk and no prize money shall be awarded.

Junior Show General Rules and Regulations

Please read all rules – no exceptions will be made!

1. All Classes are open to boys and girls, 18 years of age and under unless otherwise stated.
2. Each exhibitor must be a member of the Society. Junior Membership fees, 18 years of age and under are \$5.00. Please do not **LOOSE** your membership, duplicates will cost \$5.00. Membership fees **ARE NOT** refundable.
3. Junior Memberships allow you to exhibit in the Junior and 4-H shows only. A Junior Membership includes **one admission per day of the Fair**.
4. All exhibits (**tagged**) are to be dropped off at Building B ***Thursday** of the Fair week between **5:30 – 7:30 pm**.
5. ALL individuals and organizations are to use the online entry (via the website: www.niagaraex.com) or ensure that the form is mailed by **MAY 19, 2023** for your tags to be mailed to you. Organizations please make your entry in the name of your organization and use your permanent mailing address. (If postal code does not appear on the entry form, prize money will not be mailed.).
6. All exhibits receiving a premium, unless exempted, must remain until the close of the show. Prize money will be forfeited if this rule is violated.
7. **All entries must have tags!**
8. All exhibits must be the bonafide property of the exhibitor. Any person showing anything for competition not his or her own shall forfeit prize money. All exhibits must have been made since the last Fair and not previously exhibited at this Fair.
9. All articles are exhibited at the owner's risk.
10. Exhibits not complying with this Prize List may be exhibited at the owner's risk and no prize money shall be awarded unless authorized by the Committee Chairperson.
11. Exhibitors will be allowed only **ONE** entry in each section; i.e. Class 20 Section 5
12. It shall be the duty of the judges to award such premiums as they consider the exhibit is entitled. They may withhold a prize from any exhibit improperly classed or not worthy of a prize.
13. No interference will be tolerated while judging is taking place or during the stated time of exhibit delivery.
14. After judging, the winner's tags will be opened.

DEFINITIONS

Annual – A plant that completes its life cycle from seed to seed within one growing year. The seeds germinate to produce a plant with flowering shoots which die completely after seed production.

Bloom - Individual flower, one to a stem, specimen blooms should be disbudded.

Bud - Undeveloped growing point which may become a shoot, leaf or flower.

Catus – Any member of the family Cactaceae: fleshy plants on which the leaves are replaced by scales or sharp spines.

Collection - A specified number of cut flowers, potted plants, branches, fruits, vegetables and/or nuts, exhibited for cultural perfection.

Container - Any receptacle for plant material. In the design classes, it is an integral part of the design

Cultivar – Forms of plants originated and maintained only in cultivation which when reproduced retain their distinguishing features.

Exhibit - An entry placed in a show either for competition or display. Once an entry has been placed it becomes an exhibit.

Herbaceous – Non-woody plants that die to the ground at the end of the growing season. Annuals, biennials and perennials are herbaceous.

Labelled – Items in the container/pot must be identified.

Perennial (Herbaceous) – A plant that lives for more than two years. The stem dies to the ground each fall. Note: Shrubs are woody perennials.

Spike - An upright stem carrying several flowers which are nearly stem less, e.g. gladiolus.

Spray - A spray is the terminal flowering growth of an herbaceous or woody plant carried on one stem. Ideally it would show all forms, e.g. flowers in bloom, buds showing colour, green buds and leaves.

Stem or Stalk - A main plant structure which supports flowers, buds, leaves or fruit.

Uniformity - All specimens in an exhibit should be as nearly alike as possible in size, form and colour. (All specimens should be at the same stage of development.)

If one or more of the exhibits is found to be suffering from an infectious or contagious disease, the inspection judge shall have the authority to bar the entry of the exhibitor; entry fee and prize money shall be forfeited.
7. All pigeons must be banded for identification. Birds shown in young classes MUST wear correct band of the year born.
8. The Society will not be responsible for any loss or damage, regardless of cause, all exhibits being entered at the sole risk of the owners.
9. Judging under American Poultry Association and ALL JUDGES' DECISIONS WILL BE FINAL.
10. All entry tags will be closed during judging.
